Dear Parents/Guardians:

Re: Fair Notice for Dealing with Threatening Behavior

The safety of our children is a top priority for us all. We, as a school system have been involved in intensive safety training with our community partners—the police, Mental Health and other agencies. Together, we have developed a plan for responding to all situations in which students may be posing a threat to themselves and others.

This letter is to inform you that we, as a school division, now have a policy that requires principals to complete a "threat assessment" in all cases of students making significant threats to harm themselves or others. The purpose of the assessment is to determine how best to support high-risk student so that their behavior does not become hurtful or destructive. If your child comes home to tell you that a student has behaved in a threatening way at school, please be assured that your principal will be taking measures to deal with the situation in a positive and proactive manner. If your principal invites you to a meeting to discuss safety concerns about your own child, please be assured that policy is being followed and that the goal is safety, not punishment.

This letter is intended to serve our community with fair notice that we, as a school community, will not accept "no response" to a serious threat. Our goal is to respond to all threats in a professional manner that provides for a healthy and caring learning environment.

We are proud to be able to provide this level of support to our school communities and are most fortunate to have our community partners at our side.

Traumatic

Incident Protocol

First Aid Kits - located in Staff room and office.
All exit doors except the main doors are locked during school time for safety purposes.
Parents, visitors and students who arrive during school hours must use the front doors.
Inclement weather in Winter - Listen to local radio station in the early morning for possible school closure or bus cancellations.

Outside Safe Zone - In the event of an emergency outside the school we will gather at Pure Energy Early Learning Centre (Day care - Formerly Knights of Columbus building)

Inside Safe Zone - Hallway or gym (in case of severe weather/tornado warning).
Signals - Evacuate building - Fire Alarm will ring.
Secure Building/Lock All Doors - Teachers will be given a signal (all call over the intercom system)

Reporting

1. There will be three reporting periods per year.
 - First report - end of November
 - Second report - middle of March
 - Third report - end of June
2. Student-led conferences will be held for all students shortly after each reporting period.

Since Education is to take into consideration the whole child, curriculums must be flexible enough to meet the needs of the individual child.

In light of the above and because students are required to reach certain standards for a particular grade level, we use the following devices for evaluation:

1. Teacher made tests
2. Daily work
3. Standardized tests
4. Observation
5. Attitudes of student
6. Check lists
7. K-3 Initiative testing
8. Other - based on the new curriculum.

School Schedule

1. School time

The following is a schedule of school hours;

Classes start at 8:50 a.m. and continue until 11:50 a.m.

Classes begin at 12:50 in

the afternoon and students are dismissed at 3:20.

2. 6 Day Cycle

We run on a 6day cycle with 9 periods per day and 54 periods in a 6 day cycle.

3. Monthly calendars are sent out at the beginning of each month indicating the

school days, Kindergarten dates, and other special events or activities

scheduled for the month. Please keep these posted in a handy place.

Religious Activities

Grade 2 - First communion celebration in May.

Grade 3 - Reconciliation - takes place in the fall.

Grade 4 - Bible Presentation ... this take place early in the fall.

Each student is presented a Good News Bible which he/she keeps and is encouraged to used throughout life.

Masses, Reconciliation celebrations and weekly Gospel Assemblies are scheduled for all students, on a regular basis School Division Masses are held on the first Wednesday in Advent and on Ash Wednesday.

We encourage as many parents as possible to participate, with their children, at these celebrations, and to be faith models to their children. Children practice what they see in the home and school.

Pre-Kindergarten Program

Our school will host a Pre Kindergarten program, The Pre K program promotes meaningful family involvement, integrated health, social services, educational supports, active parent school and community partnerships and a culturally affirming environment.

The program runs Monday - Thursday in the school from 8:50 - 11:50. Fridays are family activity days. Applications and screening for 3 and 4 year olds is available at the school. Admittance will be on a greatest need basis.

In School Special Program, Trips and Excursions

We are very fortunate to live in an area, which has an interesting history and varied locations of interest in our immediate surroundings. Teachers are encouraged to make use of the world beyond the classroom as it stimulates and reinforces learning. These programs and excursions usually involve some cost to the students. On occasion there is a cost for transportation and admission. We do our up most to keep these costs to a minimum, and we may ask you, as parents/guardians to help bear the cost unless other means of raising funds are found.

We ask for your co-operation and support for all of these ventures, as they have a significant value to the overall education of your children.

St. Mary's Community Council

School Community Councils are established to help strengthen the capacity of schools to improve children's learning. The purpose of School Community Councils to develop shared responsibility for the learning success and well-being of all children and youth and to encourage and facilitate parent and community engagement in school planning and improvement processes.

A parent or community member serving on the council is a dedicated volunteer providing advice for educational planning and decision making at the school level. They are interested in working with others to support the student learning success and well-being. Members must be willing to be guided by the "principles" that support good School Community Councils and be able to provide a two year commitment to the work of the Council.

Lunch Policy

Parents who wish to have their child(ren) stay at school for lunch must pay \$12.00 a month for the first child in each family and \$4.00 for each additional child. Kindergarten children only pay half the above amount since they attend only half-time.

Exception - Rural bus students, Structured Learning students, and any students living south of the railway tracks. This fee is payable to the school on a monthly basis on the first day of each month. Post-dated cheques or full payment for the year is encouraged. If your child is only staying on occasional days \$1.00 per child is the cost. Parents can opt in or out on a monthly basis, however, we ask that you notify the office of your intentions.

Dress Code

Students are expected to dress in a manner that reflects Catholic values. Appropriate

shorts and T-shirts are permitted.

Telephone

Our school phone number is 634-3541. This is a business phone and must be recognized as such. Personal calls are, therefore, discouraged. Please have your child make after school arrangements before leaving for school in the morning and make the arrangements the night before. Students are required to ask for permission to use the phone. Personal Cell phones are not allowed.

Medication

Medication will not be given to the students unless special arrangements have been arranged between the home and school. This medical information and all medication will be kept in the office in a locked cabinet.

Expectations

RESPECT YOURSELF, RESPECT OTHERS, BE PREPARED.
All students are to be on their best behavior at school or any school related activity. Hopefully, this kind of behavior will carry over into the home and community.

Lockers

Are the property of the school and should the need arise may be inspected from time to time.

Peanut-Alert School

Our school is Peanut-Alert school. This can only be achieved with the help of all the students at the school and their parents. This decision is based on the knowledge that a few students are allergic to peanuts and the severe effect that can result from contact with nuts. These reactions can easily be prevented if students and parents are aware of the reasons for becoming a PEANUT-ALERT SCHOOL and how they can help avoid allergic reactions from occurring in these students.

EXTRA-CURRICULAR ACTIVITIES

HOUSE LEAGUES

All students from grade 3 -8 are placed in house Leagues. House leagues are carried out at recess and noon. Points and awards are given based on participation and scores. Students do their own coaching and refereeing under staff supervision.

Interschool Sports

We have interschool sports with other Estevan schools for grades 5-8 in a number of sports.

Band

All grade 6,7 and 8 students are in the band program. They participate in a classroom setting as well as in large group situations. Students are expected to participate in all concerts and rehearsals.

The main goal of the band program is educational experience through public performances.

Track and Field

Our students participate in our Track and Field Meet. This meet is usually held in late May or early June. Our school meet is run on a standards basis whereby students receive ribbons for achieving a certain standard rather than competing against each other every student receives a ribbon.

Field Trips

Students are taken on various trips during the year. Some of the trips include skiing, Cannington Manor, Kenosee Waterslides, Agribition, Roche Percee Rock Formations, and Hidden Valley Resort.
